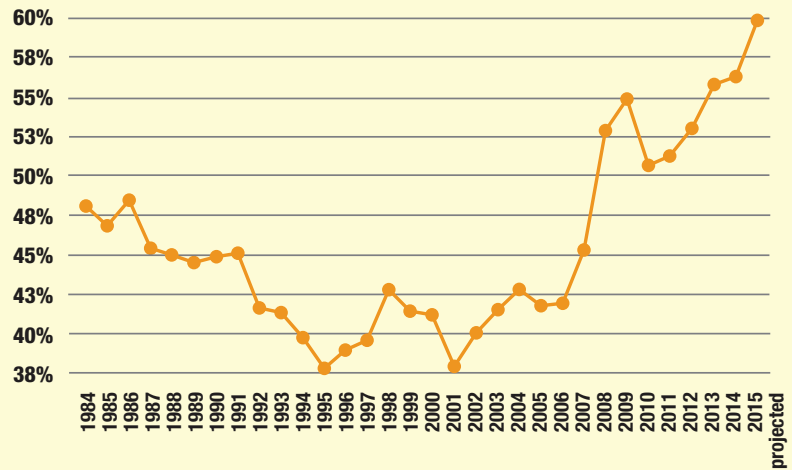
## Recovery Begins



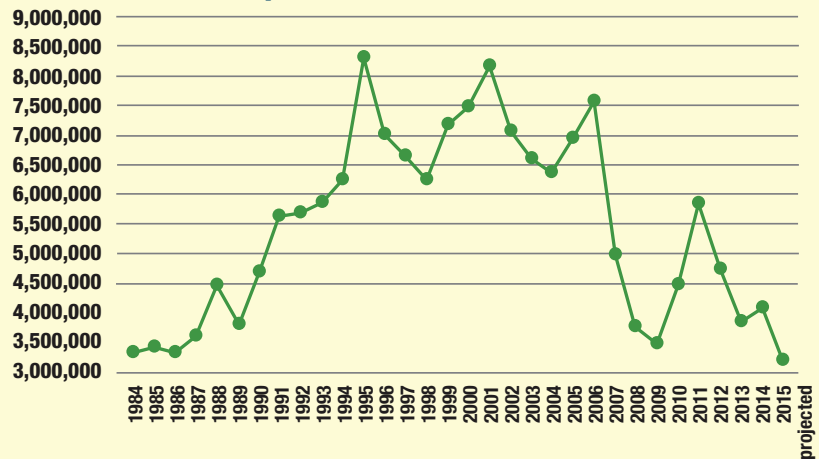
**B**y almost any measure, overall cotton fundamentals have been in a terrible recession. The light at the end of the tunnel is beginning to brighten. We won't get to the end of the tunnel overnight, but as the old saying goes "you have to start somewhere." That "somewhere" is beginning to take shape with the first glimpse of 2015's projected supply and demand numbers provided by USDA during their annual outlook conference in February.

After five consecutive years of world production outpacing world consumption, the 2015 marketing year is currently projected to bring a refreshing change in course. At the Agricultural Outlook Forum in Washington, DC, this past February, USDA projected that world consumption will outpace world production by three million bales. While this would represent a much needed drawdown of global stocks, coupled with the USDA March 31 planting intentions, things definitely get more interesting. The projected Mid-South planted acres are the lowest ever, and when you combine the Mid-South and the Southeast, the total acreage projection is the lowest in over 30 years. The state of Texas alone will account for over 60% of the U.S. acreage for the first time ever. The growing season on the Texas High Plains will be

even more critical in determining cotton prices this season.

When we consider the demand around the world for better quality, machine harvested cotton, the statistics show a much tighter situation than the overall global cotton balance sheet. The U.S., Brazil, and Australia produce the majority of the world's low contamination, machine harvested cotton. 2015 production in Brazil is projected to remain relatively flat at around seven million bales, down 12% from 2013. The drought in Australia continues and the early projection there for 2015 is a production number around

2.5 million bales, which is almost 50% below their 2011-2013 average. With strong demand globally for better machine harvested fibers and less competition, there should be excellent demand for all of the higher grades from the Memphis/Eastern region, which makes the weather on the High Plains even more important. The typical uncertainties that always surround the High Plains production will need to resolve themselves before we know if enough high quality cotton will be produced to meet the anticipated demand.

## Office Administrators—Valuable Team Members

Further, from a New York futures perspective, the quality or tenderability of the Texas crop becomes very important. Given that Memphis/Eastern production will likely fall 1.5 to 2 million bales and the excellent demand for this growth, the price of the Memphis/Eastern tenderable qualities should remain above the tender price for most of the 2015-2016 season. Therefore, as we progress through the next marketing year, the extent of rallies in the futures market and the differences between each

futures month will be highly dependent on the quality of the Texas crop.

In conclusion, we are optimistic that Memphis/Eastern cotton producers will have opportunities throughout the coming season to sell cotton at better prices than are available today. I hope all of our producers are having a successful planting season, and Staplcotn looks forward to marketing your cotton in 2015-2016. 🌱
